

	Re-Enrolling Adult Learners with Administrative Holds and Past Due Balances  When students with some college, no credential (SCNC) are unable to re-enroll at their former institutions, institutions lose out on potential enrollments and students lose out on continuing their education. A number of administrative and financial barriers stand in the way of reenrollment, including transcript holds, registration holds, past due balances, and other related issues. To help address these barriers within Kentucky, CPE partnered with Ithaka S+R to identify a set of actionable recommendations related to re-engaging and supporting stopped out students within the state.
