Shelby County Schools Dual Credit

Shelby County Public Schools students have the opportunity to earn up to 24 college credits free of charge during high school thanks to the generosity of the Shelby County Board of Education (up to 18 credits) and the KHEAA Scholarship (up to 6 credits).

Shelby County Public Schools have a dual credit partnership with Jefferson Community & Technical College.

University of Louisville Dual Credit Program

The U of L High School Dual Credit Program offers qualified, local high school students the opportunity to earn college and high school credit simultaneously before they receive their high school diploma. Benefits of the program include:

- Develop a college transcript while in high school.
- Experience college curriculum and instructional methods.
- Shorten the amount of time required to complete a college degree.
- High school students save money by reduced costs; tuition for a UofL dual credit college course is \$91 per credit hour beginning academic year 2022-2023. - these rates do not apply to distance education or winter term courses.
- Schools participating in the dual credit progaram are eligible for the Dual Credit Scholarship Program.
- Access to campus services including our writing center, libraries and state-of-the-art Student Recreation Center available to all high school students.

The GEAR UP Kentucky Vision: Every student prepared for postsecondary success.

The GEAR UP Kentucky Mission: The mission of GEAR UP Kentucky is to increase the number of students in lowincome Kentucky communities who are ready to successfully transition to and through postsecondary education. They do this by providing services and support to prepare the whole student and equipping their families, institutions, and communities to promote and sustain student success.

Authorized by Congress in 1998, GEAR UP (an acronym for Gaining Early Awareness and Readiness for Undergraduate Programs) is a competitive federal grant program designed to increase the high school graduation and college-going rates of students in low-income communities.

GUK is providing services to their postsecondary-going students, called "GEAR UP Scholars," through their first year at nine partner postsecondary institutions.
