Rm 163B Applying Artificial Intelligence to Transfer Advising (Connect the Path)

Course equivalency data play a crucial role in facilitating seamless transfer pathways for students, traditionally crafted and maintained through labor-intensive manual reviews. However, the vast array of potential combinations hinders the creation of a truly comprehensive and accurate course equivalency database between institutions. Addressing this challenge, a collaborative effort between UC Berkeley, the National Association of Higher Education Systems, and the State University of New York has harnessed the power of natural language processing models. Together, they have developed an innovative interactive course recommender system specifically designed to streamline the course equivalency mapping process. Building upon this foundation, the research team has extended their efforts to devise personalized cross-campus transfer plans for individual students. This session aims to provide a comprehensive overview of the research, covering key aspects such as the underlying theory, methodologies employed, data analysis, findings, and the practical implications of the developed solutions for education practitioners.
