Dual Credit: Where We Are and Where We're Headed

With credentialing, are you working with SACSCOC?

Per the current regulation:

"Participating institution" means a postsecondary institution that:

4. Is a:

- a. Kentucky Community and Technical College System institution;
- b. Four (4) year Kentucky public college or university; or
- c. Four (4) year private college or university that is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools and whose main campus is located in Kentucky

Is there discussion of removing the requirement that students only take 2 dual credit classes their 11th and 2 their 12th grade year? Many of our students take 1 class as juniors but need 3 dual credit scholarships as 12th graders.

There is no requirement regarding the number of dual credit courses available to a student; rather, there is a limitation on scholarship availability. Adjustments to the dual credit scholarship legislation are under consideration in this legislative session. You can get updates on the Kentucky Legislature [here](#). Specifically, you may want to watch for updates on [HB18](#). CPE and other state agencies will provide details on pertinent changes following the legislative session.
